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News from our GT Director

As D51 explores sustainability and possible school consolidations, we have begun getting questions about the impacts on gifted education. When the school board started discussing possibilities, departments across our district were asked to start thinking through impacts and actions we might need to take. These are technical actions, but all are grounded in continuing to support students in the best way possible. Here are the possible actions:

• Configuration of Elem GT Staffing - This is determined by school size and the number of ID'd students. Even if a school is not closing or receiving new students there may be an



become more detailed.

adjustment in staffing. These decisions are made based on the whole district picture. We will work with HR to determine the process and timeline once decisions are made.

- Configuration of MS GT Staffing We can only do half or full-time positions at MS and think through staffing of the Challenge Program.
- Inventory of GT materials These are all bought with grant funds and we have to keep track of these resources and electronics
- Challenge Program There a lot details and supports within this program.
- Spreadsheets, Synergy Plans, and End of Year tasks Every year we have clear plans on how to close out the year and help transition students to a new school. Majority of the time these transitions are from elementary to middle school and to high school. We will handle this like we always do but on a bigger more intentional scale.








<u>Doodling and how to get started"</u> are both intriguing articles about doodling. Please enjoy some of Miles' awesome doodle art.


















Student Book Reviews




We have a lot of great things happening at Pear Park!


Our first-grade students just wrapped up their onomatopoeia poems; we discussed the differences between fiction and


nonfiction books and poetry, then discussed the importance of descriptive words.


First graders worked hard to write poems that gave their audience a clear picture in their minds!




National History Day

These are just a few titles of performances at a National History Day preview on February 10th at East Middle School. Twenty eight students from EMS spent weeks researching and analyzing topics





National History Day in Colorado is not a single day...


National History Day in Colorado is a social studies and literacy program that equips students in elementary, middle, and high school with the skills necessary to succeed in college and the real world. Students participate in a project-based learning curriculum that emphasizes critical reading and thinking, research, analysis, and the drawing of meaningful conclusions. Students can complete these projects in groups or as individuals in one of five categories: documentary, paper, exhibit, performance, or website. They then compete in one of our fifteen regions across the state in either the junior (middle school) or senior (high school) division, or in the elementary poster contest (4th and 5th graders). Regional winners compete at the State Contests in May on the University of Colorado Denver campus. First and second place state winners compete in Nationals at the University of Maryland, College Park in June. National History Day in Colorado reaches nearly 23,000 students across the state each year. We also provide teacher trainings, research field trips, supply grants, classroom resources, scholarship opportunities for students, and graduate and continuing professional education courses for teachers.







Rocky Mountain PBS Kids

Meet the 'hope dealers' behind the Denver Dream Center

DENVER — For the Denver Dream Center, hope is a commodity that can't be sold. It's routinely given away, at no charge.

"I'm a hope dealer," explained Donny Andrews, who works at the organization. "We go out and rescue people and restore lives and dreams."

The Denver Dream Center mainly works with formerly incarcerated people who leave prison and end up without a place to live after their release, something Andrews understands personally.

"I was released on May 11th of last year and was connected with the Dream Center and they helped me put my life back together," explained Andrews, adding that he needed to learn basic life skills.

"It's rough getting out prison after 33 years of incarceration, and not knowing how to use a phone, and not knowing how to go grocery shopping."

<u>According to the National Low Income Housing Coalition</u>, formerly incarcerated people are almost 10 times more likely to experience homelessness than the general population.

After spending time in and out of prison for several years, then experiencing homelessness, Tyrone Thompkins told Rocky Mountain PBS how excited he is to finally move into his own home soon.

"I'll be moving into an apartment on the first of March, the day of my birthday!" he said excitedly, crediting the Denver Dream Center for making it happen.

Now Thompkins works for the organization as a part of the street team that does direct outreach with the unhoused in Denver, many of whom were formerly incarcerated like Thompkins.

"It's time for me to go back out into the community that I was destroying and help," he said. "It has changed my life and I'm truly blessed."

Bryan Sederwall moved to Denver 16 years ago and immediately saw the necessity to connect those experiencing homelessness with not only resources, but also hope and inspiration.

"We say 'See a need, then meet the need.' We do everything from helping men and women transition from incarceration, or get out of gangs, and get back to community and reestablish their families," said Sederwall.

These days, Sederwall is affectionately known as Pastor B.

"People ask me, as a pastor, where's my church? I tell them to look at the city and that's our church; it's the people," he said. "It's not just on Sundays, but we hyper focus on Monday through Saturday by building a community."

The organization provides continuous support for the unhoused to also address issues including hunger, addiction, and abuse. And according to Pastor B, the best way to do that is by finding people where they are and just starting a simple conversation.

"Someone [will] be embarrassed about their story, or their background, and they'll share that and someone else will be like 'yeah me too!' So, it's no longer baggage, but it becomes a platform for them to move forward and be successful."
