

Dear D51 Colleagues and Families,

The American Pediatric Association offers guidelines suggesting a balanced daily routine for school-aged children and teens, which includes family time, outdoor activities, physical exercise, and adequate sleep. devices, go to "Settings," find "Digital Wellbeing," and click the chart icon at the top right to view "Daily Use." These tools provide a detailed breakdown of daily usage by app or site, helping families become more conscious of how time is spent online. By becoming aware of screen time, families can start conversations about reducing dependence on smartphones and certain apps that monopolize attention. In his recent book

"The Anxious Generation," Dr. Jonathan Haidt advocates for not only limiting technology use but also replacing it with more fulfilling activities. Many children, accustomed to screen time, may

To combat this, we need to invest effort in introducing meaningful activities that can replace screen time, such as group play, visits to parks, reading books, cooking together, and playing board games. Transitioning away from screen dependency is a gradual process, but it is vital as we've come to understand the profound effects excessive screen use has on our children's social, emotional, and educational development. We have started making these changes in our own home (you can monitor and limit time on game devices, too) and have observed significant improvements not just in our child's life, but in meaningful family interactions as well.

As we continue to find ways to better create sustained access to attention-fostering spaces and build spaces that maximize learning and thriving in our D51 schools, we look forward to a strong partnership with all D51 families. Tackling this initiative requires a community-wide effort to ensure our children can thrive in a digitally balanced environment.

Social Worlds and Youth Well-Being Study Presentation

In February, Dr. Anna Mueller and her research team from the University of Indiana and British Columbia University released their findings and recommendations report on the Social Worlds

and Youth Well-Being Study. From 2019 through mid-2023, her research team worked with seven of our secondary schools, conducting research to determine why our suicide risk and completion rate for adolescents is higher than state and national averages. During the study, students, staff, and families were interviewed. The results and recommendations of the study are profound and have been very enlightening to our participating schools and community members. The full report can be found here.
